Besides, that many models would cost a pretty penny. He had other worthwhile railroad stuff to spend his money on.

His answer was elegant: build a garden center. A building or two, some greenhouses, a bit of vegetation, and a parking lot fit the bill—and the space. Rich's November clinic was a Power-Point presentation of the construction of his AtoZimmerman business, named for a gardening friend.

Rich went into detail about how he planned the new industry layout, selected the buildings and details, and constructed the HO-scale design. He offered many practical tips and honest advice. For example, he pointed out that it is "always a good idea to read through the instructions." Apparently, that was a lesson


in the hobby for many years, has done several clinics, and is currently the RMR AP Program chair.

Rich used kits to build the greenhouses, and he kit-bashed the main building. He also used a number of products to create the tree nursery and to represent beds for tomato and other plants that would be offered for sale.

As he worked, he studied the scene, looking for what was missing: those details that make a model look as though it were scaled down reality. Adding a fence helped separate the business from its neighbors. Applying ground foam in just the right places suggested how the grassy areas would be mowed. Adding signs and clutter made the business look alive. All of these were added to enhance the realism of the scene

Rich is a dedicated modeler, a well spoken presenter, and effective promoter of the hobby. His clinic was yet another example of his talents.

He brought them to demonstrate the three major classes of this kind of steam locomotive. Geared locomotives were used extensively by logging companies because they could handle terrible track, steep grades, and very sharp turns. All of these models are HO-scale. —SH

More November Show & Tell Steam On Display



Al Johnson brought his HO-scale Class S-1 4-8-4 Northern steam engine lettered for, of course, the Great Northern Railway. The prototype for this engine was delivered in the spring of 1928, and it was used on the new

heavier and faster Empire Builder between Havre and Whitefish, Montana. This engine could handle up to fourteen of the Empire Builder cars on 1.8% grades. The original 2552 was retired in December 1957.

This HO-scale locomotive was brought by John Grigg, who claimed it was an example of why you should be careful. For example, he pointed out that the lettering was the wrong color, being white instead of silver.



Bob Hochstetter brought an N-scale 2-8-0 locomotive lettered for the Missouri Pacific, which was a surprise. Well, maybe not a surprise as Bob is President of the Missouri Pacific Historical Society.



Lettered for John Griffith's West Point & Northern, this HO-scale PFM Sierra 2-6-6-2 engine was the engine mentioned in John's column last month.
