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Hagen Explains How Archive Saves Engine 463 — story page 2

Hagen Draws Upon Archives For Restoration Challenge

Built in 1903 by the Baldwin Locomotive Works, Rio Grande engine 463 was neglected in later years. She sat rusting away, a reminder of earlier days now remembered only dimly, if at all. But unlike the fate awaiting many of her sisters, 463's future is bright. She will be repaired and renewed. Volunteer labor and a budget of \$1,000,000 will see that accomplished.

It is hard to get spare parts for a 1965 Ford Fairlane; think how much harder it is to get parts for a locomotive that is over one hundred years old, especially since so many parts for a steam locomotive were forged for that single engine. It is possible to reproduce worn components, but it becomes much harder to reproduce a missing piece.

Enter Dennis Hagen, who now works for the Denver Public Library. Although Dennis's primary interest is in the Tenth Mountain Division, because of his love of railroading questions about that industry are often referred to him.


He was able to help in the rebuilding effort by searching through the Rio Grande Collection at the Library, an archive that includes 14,000 engineering drawings. Initially contacted by the engineers working on the restoration, over time Dennis was able to supply an amazing amount of material drawn from those archives, including engineering drawings for various parts of Engine 463.

Dennis's program was an interesting description of how he was able to help, his techniques for getting that information to the re-builders, and photographs of the current state of restoration. He also briefly discussed other resources available through the Denver Public Library that would be of interest to model railroaders and rail fans.

May Meeting Well Attended

There were twenty-nine members in attendance at the Sunrise Division May 3 meeting, a good turnout. Gary Myers Division Superintendent, welcomed members and visitors after a beginning video, and then opened the business meeting with announcements.

Summer Vacations and Conventions

Summer is the time for vacations and railroad conventions. Combining the two can lead to a very enjoyable outing. We are very fortunate to live near Denver, Colorado, which is the central hub from which many western conventions can be but a day's drive. Every year we are surrounded by conventions from all organizations, including our own.

Since 2000, I have attended four National Narrow Gauge conventions, one NMRA convention, one Santa Fe Modeling & Historical Society convention, and several Rocky Mountain Regional conventions. I promised Bob Hochstetter I would visit a Missouri Pacific Historical Society in the near future, as they are often located not too far away from my in-laws in Arkansas. Many of the RMR-NMRA conventions have led me to places I probably would not otherwise have visited. This year our convention will take me back to Chama, where I get the joy of having my own narrow gauge freight, something I probably would not do or might not be able to afford with other groups.

Balancing your railroad hobby budget versus attending a convention may seem like a tough choice. After all, the cost of a new, sound—equipped locomotive seems a lot more than what my father might have paid—or just not so long ago. I balance the costs by treating the conventions like a vacation with many options available for family members. Railroad societies in particular have venues in places that cater well to families. Costs generally range from the NMRA National convention as the highest down to historical societies. Looking at the cost range, our RMR conventions are generally near the least expensive, with this year being exceptionally well—valued.

Sometimes a change in venue can be refreshing. In May, we had the Z-Scale National Convention next door at the Red Lion at Parker and I-225, the C&NW in Norfolk, Nebraska, and the Locomotive & Railway Historical Society's Membership Meeting in

Birmingham, Alabama. I was actually tempted to take my wife to the latter, with its very interesting program. And yes, I am a member. In June, we are hosting the Big Horn Mixed in Chama, New Mexico—a great charter train ride especially for the family. Also this month, The Friends of the Burlington Northern convene in Amarillo, Texas; the Santa Fe Modeling and Historical Society meets in Temple, Texas; the Southern Pacific Narrow Gauge Historical Society gets together in Fremont, California; and the N&W Historical Society gathers Lynchburg, Virginia. The National N-Scale Convention ends the month in Medford, Oregon.

In July, in addition to our National NMRA Convention, the Great Northern Railway Historical Society meets in Klamath Falls, Oregon. The Union Pacific Historical Society kicks off August, followed by the Denver, South Park & Pacific Historical Society here in Bailey, Colorado, and the Durango & Silverton's Railfest is scheduled. In September, the National Narrow Gauge Convention is set in Seattle, Washington, and the SOO Line meeting is scheduled in Thief River Falls, Minnesota. In October, the Missouri Pacific Historical Society's Annual Columbus Day weekend is happening in North Little Rock, Arkansas, and last but not least, the Southern Pacific Historical Society Convention takes place in Ventura, California.

As you can see, there are many opportunities for you to expand your train room out of the basement. Trips you have been planning to do, but haven't had the time to take, are all laid out in front of you. All you have to do is register and show up.

Every convention has its own unique characteristics, making each a different but fun experience. Enjoy them with family and friends, and take a break from the modeling to get back in touch with the actual trains and history that brought you into the hobby in the first place. I am looking forward to my brother joining me for this year's Rocky Mountain Region's Big Horn Mixed, and my first chartered narrow gauge freight. Hope to see a bunch of you there.



NMRA Notes

The NMRA has revisited its corporate status and has incorporated in the State of Missouri.


One of the driving factors was to enable the Board to conduct electronic meetings (a practice not allowed in the State of Ohio, where the NMRA was formerly incorporated). This lets the Board vote on matters of significance in the time between the Winter and Summer meetings. The move also provides the proper opportunity to revisit the regulations (bylaws) as we update them to satisfy the Missouri Corporate requirements.

The Board of Directors will meet in Grand Rapids on Friday, July 27, Saturday, July 28, and Sunday, July 29. While the Friday meeting is a closed caucus, most of the Saturday and Sunday meetings are open to all members. At this time the meeting room hasn't been determined, so check with the convention hotel after you arrive

if you're interested in attending.

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
