

Building your first layout? If you have never done it before it can appear to be a daunting task, but Dick Hunter's October clinic gave good advice on how to approach the job. He used a real example: his layout that he built in a room above his garage. He started with the partially finished room, not even fully dry—walled, and using a PowerPoint presentation showed the steps he went through until he was able to run a train.

Dick was, among other things, a contractor, and he offered many useful tips

in building the layout. For example, he found that it was not necessary to have all of the L-girders exactly level. He said that he used clamps many times as he adjusted his risers and roadbed. A Dremel tool with a grinder works well to knock off any screw points that happen to extend too far, and painting the roadbed and cork grey before laying the track makes ballasting much easier.

If you weren't there, you missed a good grounding on the steps to build a working layout.

#### **Dues Increase Slated for Upcoming Year**

n order to ensure the financial wellbeing of the NMRA into the future, there will be a dues increase on January 1, 2012, for U.S. members and overseas members served by the Chattanooga office. Regular memberships will increase by \$5 to \$44, and subscriptions to NMRA Magazine will increase by \$3 to \$22. Sustaining memberships (including the

magazine) will increase by \$13 to \$110, and student memberships (including the magazine) will increase by \$4 to \$32. In addition, our highly successful RailPass trial membership program will continue at \$9.95. The current RailPass conversion rate to regular memberships is around 65%. Memberships administered by the A, B, and C offices are not affected.

#### Other NMRA News Of Note

♦ Di Voss, who's heading up the Cruise Convention committee, continues to receive results from the survey published in the October issue of *NMRA Magazine*. To date he's received around 200 responses, and estimates those "in favor" to be about 75%. In addition, Di would like to remind those who think there won't be enough time on a Cruise Convention for layout tours, OPSIG meets or other activities, that the ship will be in port from about 8:00 a.m. until about 10:00 p.m.

- ♦ For some reason, the story that the NMRA membership has been declining over the past few years continues to persist. *It ain't true.* NMRA membership is holding steady at around 19,500. According to the latest "Membership Thermometer" figures compiled by Marketing, Advertising and Promotions manager Tom Draper, the NMRA lost 104 members between August 2009 and August 2011, but gained 91 members between August 2006 and August 2011.
- ♦ Convention news: Even though Grand Rails 2012 will have dozens of top notch model railroads open for self-guided tours, the convention committee wanted to make sure everyone has a chance to see some of their great layouts. So there will also be several bus tours to some of the area's best layouts. Layouts include every scale from z to G, and every level of completion. They're also offering a very special, exclusive seven-hour limo layout tour for groups of 6 to any of the six layouts on the self-guided list. The price for the limo is only \$120 per person. - ♦ Repeat announcement: The Howell Day Museum is issuing a new release of its highly successful Gorre and Daphetid bobber cabooses. Two new bobbers, numbered 3 and 5, are available from Headquarters immediately. A single car is US\$19.95 + \$4 shipping and handling, and the set of two is US\$34.95 + \$4 shipping and handling. Gary Myers, Division Superintendent, also announced that Sunrise Swap do-









ctober's Show & Tell was devoted to stock cars, a once profitable business for the railroads. On the right from top: Dick Hunter brought this G-stock car that featured sound effects: lowing cattle. As the night wore on, though, it became apparent that Dick's description, the "sick cow car," was apt. After awhile, Dick put the cow out of its misery and turned off the switch. Rich Flammini brought an но-scale Brighton Convention car, which celebrated their 30th Anniversary. The но-scale sт.ым&s car was built from an Ambroid kit by Don Deuell. He also scratch built the HO-scale D&RGW car based on an Ambroid plan. At the bottom is Gary Myer's Chicago & Northwestern stock car, which Gary explained "wasn't up to his normal weathering standards." However, from the close up below you can see the "hay" that Gary added, even though that hay is a lot cleaner than any hay I have seen where animals have been standing.













# October Show & Tell Continued

As early as the 1830s in England, railroads were transporting animals to market, and this traffic was very lucrative, even with the expense of the 28-hour rule and having to transport animal attendants with the stock. However, beginning after World War II and accelerating in the 1960s, trucks began to take away this traffic from the railroads. A number of factors contributed to the decline. The great stockyards, including the huge ones in Denver, Omaha, and Chicago, became less important as ranchers began to ship animals to local packing plants. Road improvements made it easier to truck stock, and since much of the car's carrying capacity was unused the cost of transport was high.

However, the railroads did not give up without a fight. The Union Pacific converted auto parts boxcars to pig carriers in the late 1960s and hauled strings of 10 or twelve of them at the end of TOFC trains. Even in the 1980s the Pennsy still had an Oscar Meyer special running.

Times change, and there is practically no stock traffic on the railroads now. The huge stockyards are weed-grown, empty pens; and the associated packing plants abandoned hulks. But if you are modeling any time before the 1970s or 1980s, then stock car shipments will add a lot of interest to your operations.

Rom the top: Bill Johnson brought two Trix Union Pacific HO-scale stock cars. These were nicely painted models. The ATSF HO-scale care was brought by John Kerbaugh. It shows some nice weathering, though fortunately it is not so realistic as to have the odor of the prototype. The two HO-scale models on the bottom are from Stewart Jones. The D&RGW car was scratch built abut 1954 using Northeastern word parts. It was based upon draings of a Reading car in the 1954 Model Railroader and was originally painted for the Pennsylvania. When Stu moved, the car got a new paint job. The Union Pacific car was a 1953 Model Die Casting kit. The original kit was all metal, but over the years the roof and floor/under frame broke, so Stewart replaced them with Northeastern wood parts.
