# Fine Points of Judging Was January Clinic

SUNRISE DIVISION PROGRAM CHAIRMAN JIM LAIRD AND DIVISION SUPERINTENDENT GARY MYERS tag-teamed the January clinic presentation, which was on the best way to prepare models for judging at NMRA model contests. Both Jim and Gary have served as judges in Regional NMRA model contests, and both have submitted models to be judged. This allowed them to give tips from both sides of the aisle: modeler and judge.

Gary stressed the importance of including good documentation with the model entry form. A modeler may have done exemplary work on a particular section, but unless this is brought to the attention of the judges it may not be noticed. As another example, the judges may not be as knowledgeable about a particular

prototype; it is very helpful to the judges for the modeler to include that information in the entry form. Gary also stressed that to do a good job on the entry form, you need to start early and not wait until it is time to submit it.

The five areas considered when judging are construction, detail, conformity, finish and lettering, and scratch-building. Gary and Jim discussed each of these areas separately and gave the scoring matrix for some of the categories.

Construction addresses the difficulty or complexity of the attempted model and how well the model is constructed. It considers quality, not quantity, and contributes to thirty-two per cent of the total score.

Detail is concerned with answering two questions: how many detail parts are added to or incorporated in the model and how complex was the detailing job? Details that support the function of the model rather than add to the setting are given greater weight. For example, correct brake rigging is more valuable than figures posed on the side of the car. Also considered are the "missing details." If a structure has power poles but no sign of a power

meter, then that is considered as a missing detail. This category contributes sixteen per cent to the full score.

Making up twenty per cent of the total score is conformity, which deals with how well the model reproduces the prototype. If a structure were magically enlarged to the prototype size, would the thickness of exposed walls be reasonable? Does the



model make logical sense? Gary pointed out that this is a very important area to document in the entry form; judges may not be as well informed as the modeler regarding prototype practice.

Finish and lettering contributes twenty per cent to the full score and is concerned with the complexity and skill displayed in the applied finish. Weathering is not necessary, but if the model is weathered is it applied so that it matches what would occur in nature?

surprisingly tributes only twelve per cent to the total score. How much of the model was scratch built and how complex

that work was are the questions to be considered by the judges.



### Why Should I Enter a NMRA or RMR Contest?

If you are not competitive and do not care about awards, why would you submit your model to be judged? Gary Myers gave one reason, saying, "Entering a contest isn't always about winning. It is to challenge yourself at how well you do against a set of pre-defined modeling standards and how you can improve. I can say that after entering seven models over the past few conventions my modeling has definitely improved, and my latest model is currently my best. In one regard, the contests have served as my own modeling tutor."

### Really, I'm Never Going To Enter a Contest...

Many of us may never enter a model into a Regional or National convention. Why should we care about these judging guidelines?

The answer is simple. The factors that judges consider are the same things that will make your model a better resident of your layout. If you look at a model through the eyes of a contest judge, you will be able to prioritize your efforts to make your work a better representative of the real world. Consider the relative contribution of each judging category. Construction, detail, and conformity are all far more than scratch building, suggesting that a well-finished kit is more impressive than a poorly done scratch build model.






