I don't remember if I still believed in him or not, but who cares. The Royal Blue, no smoke, no choo-choo, whirled around the small loop of track past a Plasticville suburban station and platform. Back then it was more fun just watching it go around and around than any child of today could imagine, or for that matter believe.

It was also enjoying listening to the radio (No TV). Sergeant Preston of the Yukon, Sky King, The Lone Ranger, and Green Hornet were some of my favorite programs. OK I'll admit it; I also listened to Billie the Brownie. In addition there were my aunt's View Master Reels (No video games). Perhaps that was actually the first form of video games.

The Christmas Story, Roy Rogers, Gene Autry and Hopalong Cassidy were viewed over and over again. Call me goofy (it's never stopped anyone before), but every year I go through a ritual on Christmas day. I pull my Royal Blue set off the shelf, run it around the track for a while and then go through all of the View Masters reels that I still have. My cousins lost or destroyed most of the ones that we had (bummer).

It's December and a little more than 66 years later it is Christmas Again and I'm watching a train go around and around. This time it's on a 255 square foot layout. This time it's not just turning the speed up and down with a small transformer on a linoleum floor. As we get older things change. At an advanced age, some of us hear little voices now and then. This time it's coming from a train engine (and you thought that I was finally totally losing it). I have to blame a number of my fellow S Gaugers for this. (I won't mention their names - they know who they are). After seeing one member's engines running on my traveling layout and being prodded to purchase one, I couldn't help myself. Boy. Oh Boy, Oh Boy. Cab lights on, cab lights off, engineers crew talk on, crew talk off, horn on, horn off, bell on, bell off, smoke on smoke off, and I feel like the Mister Miyagi of model railroading. It's so much more than wax on, wax off.

Admittedly I am an old school American Flyer enthusiast and operator (that lower life form of S Gauger). It will be a tough choice as to which one of my favorite engines absolutely has to be removed from the layout to make room for the Lionel S Gauge U33C diesel locomotive. Finally (perhaps, probably not) there will be no more distain and derision from the scale contingent about our TOY trains. OK, the lobster claw couplers are still there (I will probably change the front coupler to scale; I do it on the rear of all of my cabooses). This of course will not allow me to double head engines in the event that I win a lottery and buy more of this type of engines. I have to admit that these engines are absolutely beautiful and undeniable make AF look fairly rudimentary when put side by side. However there is one problem. I will have to make myself a wrist band, similar to those worn by football quarterbacks, just to be able to remember all of the possible functions that I can do. I don't have a Legacy System, but my limited memory bank probably couldn't handle all of those operations.

I must say that having a TMCC CAB-1system on my layout has made running trains more enjoyable than ever. It is by far, the best investment that I have made in model railroading to date. Believe me, American Flyer engines run better with TMCC and require "NO", I repeat "NO" modification at all. I have 22 AF switches that operate from a remote. If you are a real man, you have a minimum daily requirement for having a remote

in your hands. Now what you need is a lounge chair that can elevate high enough to view your entire layout.

For all non-believers, yes there is a Santa. For me, he was just hiding inside of a credit card. In 2014 it is "Christmas Again!"

High rail conversion for Flyonel Cylindrical Hoppers

Tools:

- 1] Small arbor press
- 2] Truck spreading tool [Port Line Hobbies]
- 3] Small phillips tip screw driver
- 4] Cradle
- 5] A precision measuring device, I found a digital device at Menards for about \$12.00.

This is a fairly simple but somewhat time consuming project. To complete it you will need four axle sets of S Helper wheels or other high rail wheels that would fit the axles. The measurement that I used is only for the S Helper wheels. If you use different wheels you will have to measure the back to back spacing on that set and shorten the spacer accordingly. When I

measured the b to b spacing on the scale wheel set it measured .755", spacing on the high rail wheels after checking several sets was .715" to .720" a difference of .035" to .040", thus the need to shorten the spacer.

- 1] Start by pressing the S Helper wheels off of the S Helper axles with the arbor press and set these wheels aside
- 2] Carefully remove the rotating bearing caps from each axle of the cyl. hopper and set these aside.
- 3] Remove the screw attaching the truck to the car and remove the truck.
- 4] Remove the two screws that fasten the coupler to the truck and remove it.
- 5] Turn the truck over and loosen the two screws attaching the sides of the trucks to the center piece, [two turns loose is enough]
- 6] Now use the spreading tool to gently press the side frames apart, only go far enough to get the axle out, I did only one axle at a time.
- 7] Now that you have one wheel set out of the car, pull the wheel and axle assembly apart by hand, you will have one axle piece with one wheel and one axle piece with the wheel and the plastic spacer. Holding the wheel and axle attached to the plastic spacer you can now shorten the spacer .035" to .040" or between 1/32 to 3/64 inch. I cut mine off with a modelers hand saw. After shortening the spacer you will need to clean up the hole into which the axle half will go, I used

an oval needle file, inserting it into the hole and turning it a few times.

- 8] You will now press the axles out of the scale wheels, and at this time you can put the first pair of high rail wheels on the axle halves. These, if you are using the S Helper wheels, you will be able to install them by hand no need for the arbor press here.
- 9]. You can now install the axle half back into the plastic spacer, just be careful to start them straight, these also you can put together by hand, no need for the press.
- 10] You are now ready to reinstall the first axle back into the truck. Repeat for the three other axles and you will have a high rail Flyonel Cylindrical Hopper.

Hope that this will help you out.
